Yes, at long last we are going to celebrate the Club's 50th Anniversary. On December 4th, 1970, the Jaguar Club of Tulsa came into existence with an official charter from the Jaguar Clubs of North America.

Due to the Covid pandemic, (which we are all tired of talking about!) we did not get to have our planned celebration last year. HOWEVER, we are not going to let a little thing like that stop us from having a good party!

Mark this date on your calendar - **Saturday, Dec 4th** - when we will be having dinner at the Olive Garden in Utica Square. There will be more information about this event coming as we get closer to the date.

DUES ARE DUE!!

Well folks, the bad news is, time, inflation and the national organization have caught up with us. We have not raised the club dues since 2013 but this year JCNA has raised the membership dues for all affiliated clubs by \$10.

Well, a nine year run with no dues increase is a pretty good record but this year we are going to have to face the reality that everything is more expensive and our dues are going to go up. The 2022 Dues will be **\$60.00** per year for membership in the local club and the national organization. The dues for Associate Members, meaning the local club only, will be **\$40**.

Just for grins, I did a little checking around to see what other national organizations charge and membership in the BMW club is tiered. \$58 annual and 12 month wait for rewards rebates; \$159 3 year and 6month wait for rewards or \$1750 for a lifetime.

Porsche is 1 year, \$49, 2 yrs \$90, 3 yrs \$132. By comparison it is \$100 to be an "at large" member (no local club affiliation) of JCNA, dropping to \$50 every year there after. So it is cheaper to join your local club for \$60 and get it all.

I don't know what the local BMW or Porsche club charge for dues, but I would guess the Jaguar Club is still a bargain, so send in your dues today. Remember, we have to have our national dues paid by February so please get your checks in pronto or use your banks bill pay function.

There were hamburgers, chips, hot dogs and soda available, with people lined up most of the time. The silent auction went well, and there were cases of Castrol GTX oil available to bid on in case the free 2 quarts were not enough for the drive home.

The Awards Dinner at the hotel ballroom at 6 PM was delicious, with cheese cake and ice cream for dessert!

The dinner speaker, author and newspaper columnist John Nikas, gave us a fascinating, historical account of the British auto industry. His books include: *Rule Britannia, When British Sports Cars Saved a Nation; Triumph Spitfire & Gt6: Setting the Small Sports Car Standard; The Triumph Tr: From 20ts to TR6;* and *The MG T-Series: The Sports Cars the World Loved First.*

John described how and why the British auto industry in the 20's and 30's never created large automobile manufactures, but rather consisted of many small companies with minimal automation. The British establishment saw no need for mass production of automobiles, the ones they were buying were fine, why build more. British companies relied on the apprentice system. You started sweeping floors and in 30 years you would be chief engineer. This guaranteed a static design. You learned how to do things from Fred, who learned from George. University graduates were not welcome. "I've been working here 30 years guv, how does that young whippersnapper know more than me?" So things were done by rule of thumb, just as they were always done. Heavy cast iron blocks, Lucas parts and oil leaks.

However, when Britain needed airplanes for WWII, they turned to the small auto companies for the technical know-how to build planes. Some of the first tries were not real good, but with the whippersnapper engineers, they produced very good airplanes.

The local chapter representatives of the ALS Association gave a brief talk on what they do and the terribly debilitating effects of ALS (Lou Gehrig's disease). All of the proceeds of the event went to ALS along with donations from the attendees at the awards banquet.

Bill Watkins handed out the trophies with assistance from a Vanna White stand in. With 3 places in 28 classes, the table of trophies was quite full. Recipients had to keep their acceptance speeches very short, before they were played off. We all applauded each announcement and the recipient had just enough time to say thank you. More information will be available on British Iron Touring Club web site. In the meantime, look at the web page anyway, it is interesting. After the awards, we headed back to the bar to swap stories, meet MG owners and generally talk about everything and anything, even non-auto topics (go figure).

Sunday morning, we packed up and drove home, stopping to see Dripping Springs Scenic Waterfall. They also have yurts there, I am not sure why, we are quite far from Mongolia and are not very nomadic. Oh well.




Well, we did see the waterfall, but the flow rate was a bit low. As for the springs, we could not find any springs. Not a single compression

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The Marland Mansion

On August 28th a group of club members made the drive to Ponca City to visit the Marland Mansion.

E. W. Marland holds a prominent place in Oklahoma and American history as an oil baron who once controlled 10% of all the world's oil and as a US Congressman and the 10th Governor of Oklahoma. There is also the somewhat scandalous history of Marland who, upon the death of his wife after a long illness, married his adopted daughter who became the first lady of Oklahoma.

The mansion was built between 1925 and 1928 at a cost of 5.5 million dollars. The master Architect was John Duncan Forsythe, who brought in scores of artists, sculptors, decorators and internationally renowned craftsmen to work on the project.

After falling on hard times Marland was forced to sell the home to the Discalced Carmelite Fathers in 1941 for just \$66,000. In 1948, the Fathers sold the estate to the Sisters of St. Felix who operated a private high school on the grounds. During their tenure, they built a number of structures on the grounds, though all have been removed except for Angela Hall, built in 1958, and still operating as a school. The Felician Sisters moved to New Mexico in 1975, and sold the estate to the City of Ponca City and Continental Oil Company, which transferred their partial ownership to the city, for \$1.5 million.

The amazing thing about this ownership history is that the mansion has suffered no significant damage or removal of all the artistry and artifacts attached to the home when built.

Clark Frayser had arranged for a guided tour for our group and we were lucky to have a gentleman who was quite familiar with the house and pointed out a lot of the interesting items and told us their history.

The Hunt Kitchen and the Winter room on the lower level are adjacent to each other. This is where Marland would entertain his guests to food and drink before starting off on a fox hunt or a polo match.

The ceiling of the room between the beams is covered in exquisite paintings depicting pre-Colombian Indians, travels through the Cherokee Outlet Land Run and concludes with the



discovery of oil by Marland Oil Company. A small door off the kitchen leads to the poker room, a scene of many high stakes poker games during prohibition and to the 550 ft tunnel that goes to the boathouse on the one remaining lake which is how



liquor was delivered during Prohibition.

Many of the original furnishings have been returned to the mansion over the years since the City opened it to the public. The house is truly a treasure and we spent so much time there we didn't have time to see the grounds or Artists Studio. Just trying to take in all the beautiful artwork on the walls and ceilings was almost overwhelming.

It was a lovely trip and many thinks to Clark for arranging it and to **Berne**-
