What's Happening at Jaguar Land Rover

Jaguar Land Rover's UK managing director Rawdon Glover has been moved to head up the Jaguar brand and see it through its all-electric relaunch over the next two-years.

Glover has been with JLR for over a decade, and MD since 2018. His current role will be covered by Patrick McGillycuddy, who is now standing in as interim Jaguar Land Rover UK managing director after just two years with the company - thus allowing Glover to focus on Jaguar.

In a press release issued this week, a Jaguar spokesperson said, "Jaguar will be reimagined as an all-electric, luxury brand by 2025. It will be a copy of nothing. As the business now prepares to launch the re-imagined Jaguar brand to clients around the world, we have appointed Rawdon Glover as brand managing director, Jaguar."

Meanwhile, a leak to the trade press this week appeared to suggest that JLR plan to reduce their number of dealerships in the UK from over eighty, down to less than twenty as they continue to work towards a sustainable future. Whilst the reports have not yet been substantiated and JLR is yet to make an official comment on the matter, it might indicate that perhaps even car manufacturers are moving towards a more 'online based' retail structure in the face of rising costs.

Germany's Treasured Autobahn Hits A Bump In The Road

Horsepower-flush automobiles and the 7,200-mile highway system called the autobahn, are part and parcel of national mythology in Germany. But driving on the autobahn can be a chilling experience for the timid. But it's utterly disconcerting when, ticking along at a brisk 75 miles per hour, somebody blows by me on the left and then disappears over the horizon as if I were driving a lawnmower.

For decades, German drivers (overwhelmingly male ones) have relished this ostensible perk of limitless speed, many in precision-engineered automobiles with such storied names as

Volkswagen, BMW and Mercedes Benz. Now, the climate crisis is prompting Germans to rethink their relationship with the autobahn, long feted as the crème de la crème of highway systems.

Germany's transportation sector's carbon emissions, say experts, are attributable overwhelmingly to cars and trucks – and the higher the speed of a car, the greater the emissions. What's the purpose of four or five-lane thoroughfares in an epoch when new gas-and-diesel burners will, if the EU parliament has its way, be banned by 2035 anyway?

Of course, Electric Vehicles (EVs) require good roads, too. But because their horsepower and top speeds are often lower, they require less superhighway – and more charging stations on well-kept roads. An e-car's high speed, while impressive, still generally pales to the motorheads I see on the autobahn pushing 140 miles per hour.

Also, with limited resources, the burning question in Germany at the moment is whether tens of billions of euros earmarked for new and broader autobahn wouldn't do more good building out cycling highways, like in the Netherlands, or an improved high-speed, densely networked rail service.

Ultimately, the proclivities of the car zealots have no place in the 21st century when we're racing against the clock to decarbonize our economies. The European Union is toiling to sink emissions by at least 55% by 2030 Germany wants to better that by another 10%

The need for speed varies from country to country. Here is where the worlds leading economies set their speed limits on certain roads: Japan 62 mph, UK 70 mph, Canada 75 mph, France, Italy, Russa 81mph, US 85.

Germany has the most cars on the road of any EU country (almost 49 million). And while its EV sales are soaring, government dreams of having 15 million registered battery-installed vehicles by 2030 are expected to fall far short. This is why the International Energy Agency a global energy forum, urges Germany, as well as every other country with an automobile culture, to embark immediately on a sustainable transportation revolution. The EU's Green Deal foresees Europe as the first carbon neutral continent in the world by 2050.

But Germany is stalling, with the heavy-set automobile manufacturers and their powerful lobby staunchly behind the unrepentant car lovers. In six locations in Germany – including in Berlin, practically straight through my family's backyard – new autobahn lengths are being planned or built.

Germany's ruling government coalition makes the audacious argument that more autobahn would relieve traffic jams, which provoke popular ire and cast large emission footprints. "Preposterous," responds mobility expert Urs Maier of the Berlin think tank Agora Verkehrswende. "Studies and experience show definitively that the more road you pave, the more traffic you'll get..."

Environmentalists, on the other hand, insist that the key to bringing mobility emissions under control is moving private and commercial traffic from the road to rails. (German long-distance trains are largely electrified and boast less than a quarter of a car's footprint. But Germany's rail network – once a source of national pride – has suffered greatly from years of neglect under the various Angela Merkel-led governments between 2005 and 2021.

A wide-ranging shift away from internal combustion engines isn't going to doom either road travel or the autobahn. Instead, Germany's highways could be reimagined: a slimmer autobahn for e-cars, e-buses and e-trucks with regular high-speed charg-(cont'd on page 6)




EuroExpo Car Show Case Community Park Sand Springs, OK



Riley's Rebuilds

Editors Note: An article about this young ladies entrepreneurial enterprise appeared in the May issue of the Hagerty's Driver's club magazine.

A gated neighborhood in an upscale Tampa suburb is a strange place to send your carburetors for rebuilding. The shop sits in the three-car garage of a lovely home. There is a long table with some chairs, and a workbench is parked next to a couple of soda blasters. All is lit by florescent bulbs overhead.

This the modest domain of Riley's Rebuilds, a carburetor rebuilding service headed by Riley Schlick.

Riley is a 17-year-old girl: A surfing, skating, soccer-playing, Jeep-driving high school senior. Four of her high school friends, all girls, have learned to rebuild carburetors too, rounding out the staff of Riley's Rebuilds. Ship them your worn-out carburetor, and they'll ship it back soda-blasted, ultrasonic-cleaned and rebuilt to original specifications.

Riley has always been interested in cars, starting out "holding the flashlight for my dad." When she was 14, she told her parents that she wanted to buy a car that she could rebuild, getting it ready for when she was old enough to drive. Her parents said it needed to have a manual transmission, not go above 80 mph, and have a real roll bar. The logical answer was a manual-transmission, four-cylinder Jeep.

To buy it, she needed a job, and the only place that would hire a 14-year-old is a local grocery chain. No, her father said, we're going to go out in the garage and figure out a way to make money. Hence the carburetor rebuilding operation, which has been in business for three years.

The business started with word-of-mouth, then it went to a Facebook page, "where it really blew up," Riley says. From one post, she received 2.5 million views, over 500,000 interactions, 10,000 shares, and 12,000 followers in four days. She figures she's rebuilt carbs from all 50 states, and she and her co-workers, try to restore the carbs back to stock condition, "but some of them are really messed up." So she's always on the lookout for spare parts, like choke flappers, linkages, rods, and jets.

Business is booming. The world may have abandoned carburetors for fuel injection, but there's "a whole weird underground" that still needs carbs, for circle track and drag racing and street rods. She has set up a Riley's Rebuilds booth at several hot rod shows, "and I had a customer tell me he needed a carburetor to bring his car to the show, and he bought one from us there, right off the floor, and took it home and installed it, and drove the car back."

Riley has a year of high school left, and she foresees no end to Riley's Rebuilds, even if she goes away to college. She's already talked to one college soccer coach who has pledged to help find room in the engineering department to let her do rebuilds there if she comes to his school.

"This has been a great experience," she says. "I've learned

so much, and not just about carburetors."

That's Riley in the middle.
